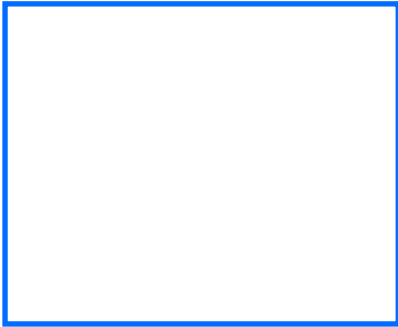


Grain Harvest in Grandfather's Day

Please stick the work paper 1b pictures over the right text:



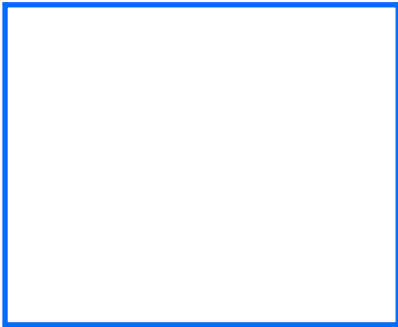
The farmer is checking to see if the grain is ripe.



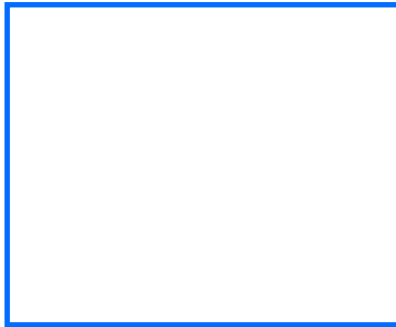
Scything was mens'work.



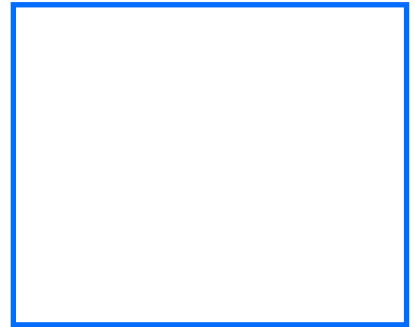
The stems are dry and hard, so that the scythe quickly becomes blunt and needs regular whetting.



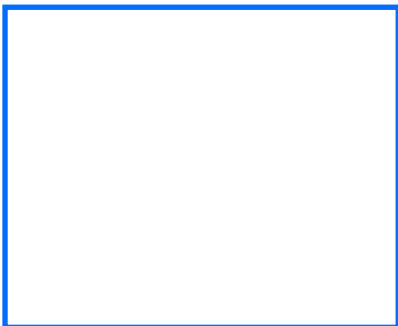
The cropped grain can't just lie there. It has to be gathered. That's women's work.



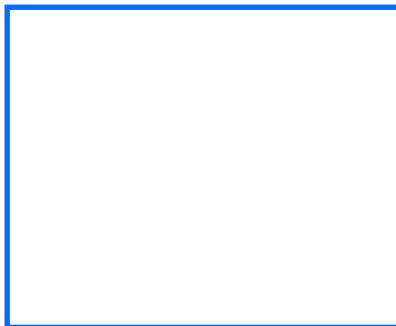
This is a reaping machine with a collecting bin.



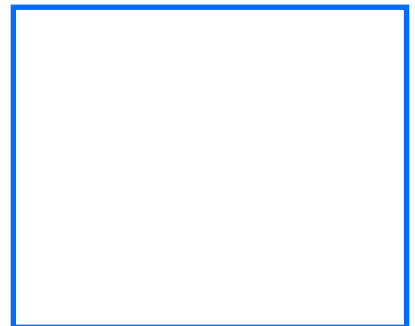
The binder is a great help to the farmer in harvest time. In one go the grain is mown and bound into a sheaf.
